HSP will break apart, and all health activities funded by our biggest donor will stop at the end of next year. This is a significant change for HSP and maybe an opportunity to become more responsible for our projects. We will take care of the staff involved there, and we may take advantage of their long experience and faithfulness to HSP by opening new projects in the health field. There is still so much to be done there, and we want to do it as per the tradition of HSP, humbly, with poor means, loving care and dedication, grateful to have been called to this beautiful mission.

Who we are

Howrah South Point (H.S.P.) Social Welfare & Communiy Development Center is an Indian organization founded in 1976 by Father Francis Laborde, a French Roman Catholic priest of the Prado. He spent nine years in the slum of Pilkhana, Howrah (West Bengal), which inspired Dominique Lapierre for his best seller "The City of Joy".

He came out with the conviction that we cannot be really ourselves human persons if we neglect our brothers and sisters marginalized in a society where we live in solidarity with them. It is not only a question of love. It is first of all a question of justice.

A small home for handicapped children with a dispensary for the poorest was established in Andul Road. It went through a number of developments, from the healthcare programme founded in 1977, the establishment in Jalpaiguri in 1982, the mobile dispensaries in 1998, up to a national award in 2013.

What we do

We want to share our life with the handicapped of the society that we serve, working for them with competence, loving care and compassion so that the handicapped and destitute children, all the deprived people may reintegrate the society. Our action goes through three main programmes:

- REHABILITATION HOMES for the physically, mentally and socially challenged children.
- EDUCATION PROGRAMMES: H.S.P. has Formal Schools, Non-Formal Schools and Special Schools.
- HEALTH PROGRAMMES to reach out those who cannot have access to any structure.



Highlights of the year

April 2021

For more than a month, the routine of HSP has been impacted again because of the Covid-19 situation in India. To prevent the virus from coming into our homes, the staff and children have reduced their interactions with outsiders to the minimum that means mainly to buy essentials. In EPN, Baksara and Ashaneer where HSP runs schools as well as homes, the teachers were coming to give classes to the children of the homes. It has not happened anymore since April when the virus started spreading fast again. Therefore, we can say that a holiday routine began before holidays started.

May 2021

Holidays have been decided for the children of Howrah for one month (from the 15th of May to the 15th of June). Nevertheless, some of them are staying in the homes, the

situation making it difficult for their families to take care of them for one month or to pick them up because of the transport restrictions. In Howrah, 36 children are currently staying in our Homes (two girls and nine boys at EPN, six girls in Lalkuthi, three boys at Baksara and 16 at Ashaneer). The children of Jalpaiguri all stayed in our homes. The staff is also staying to look after the children though some of them go back home to take some rest. They are all fine.

One of our Ashaneer staff witnessed "Covid period arrived at the same time of holidays so it did not change much for Ashaneer Home. Two weeks before lockdown, we already set up new rules to prevent contamination. Teachers were not giving classes anymore and office staffs were not allowed to go to their workplace in Ashaneer. Going outside was regulated. Concerning the children, now we are 16 with 9 girls and 7 boys. Despite having a little slower daily routine, we do not feel much these dark moments for India. We have the great chance to have a beautiful

playground so we can play many games such as football and Kabaddi. We take advantage of this situation to experiment new activities for children and they look happy! As Sabina said 'we are very lucky to be here!"

Despite worries about lockdown, relatives and recently the cyclone Yaas, every home tries to be a cocoon where children can be less aware of this difficult time for India. Hopefully for HSP, the cyclone Yaas did not hit Howrah strongly and no major damages can be seen.

Indirectly, the cyclone even was an occasion for the boys of EPN to enjoy the experience of sleeping two nights in a classroom, the school beeing the most resilient building of EPN. This change of environment made them very joyful. The school has already been used as a playground and a bedroom (what the children could hardly imagine before) for all the children successively to carry out a quarantine before returning to the





June 2021

From 2020 onwards, HSP kept on working hard to provide Food relief in many places. As lockdowns severely affect the poorest, HSP is trying to help as much as possible. After providing first needs items on the day of Father Laurent's Birthday, June 9, HSP kept reaching the poorest all over West Bengal and even extended to Odisha state. A total of 2552 food relief were donated. (See p12 for full relief details)

July 2021

On July 12, we received donation in kind worth 60 000 Rs. from the french consulate of Kolkata. As lockdown was still going on, official France National day celebration was cancelled. The consulate decided to donate all the budget of the event to Howrah South Point. We received a bicycle, a cupboard, a water filter as well as many smaller items such as chairs. We were very thankful to

receive those gifts from the consulate.

August 2021

We celebrated India National Day with Football tournament. Because of lockdown and covid, It is complicated for us to let the children go out or celebrate major events. However, we tried to manage to make small events in the Homes. In August, for the India National day, we organized a football tournament for kids and staffs on the 14th and then celebrated national day on the 15th. We had 4 teams for both staff and children tournament. The kids were very happy with the tournament and won trophies and special gifts as water bottles and new jerseys!

November

In november, Jalpaiguri held their Olympic Games. All Jalpaigrui homes were involved. It was a wonderful day for children as well as didis and dadas.

December 2021

On Friday the 3rd, Howrah South Point celebrated the International Day of Persons with Disabilities. We demonstrated in the street around Ashaneer home. Children were very happy. After the demonstration we had special dances from HSP children. Then we played during the whole morning.

This day is special for HSP as we have been trying to make the life of disabled children as good as any children, because we are all the same. It is our priority to do not put disabled people aside but include them: 10% of HSP staffs are disabled. What is more, HSP knows how much gathering destitute and disabled children makes a better world. It develops their empathy and their acceptance of differences. They take care and learn a lot from each others.

January 2022

At the end of 2021, India Government allowed tourists to come to India. Many of our donors/partners already came several times and know how important it is for us, friends, partners, members of the family. We had the chance to have Veronique in January who visited all Howrah homes along with dispensaries and slums. She participated to Ashaneer's daily life for a week with painting and drawing classes. Then Evelyne & Rémi in March, who visited both Jalpaiguri and Howrah homes. Every friends' visit gives children and staff lots of joy and happiness. It empowers us to give the best for the organisation.

February 2022

On the 15th of February, HSP had the chance to welcome back external children for Special schools, physiotherapy and psychotherapy. The children had not been allowed to attend special classes after almost 2 years!

This day was full of joy for everybody. Not only it has an impact on the children, but it benefits to all HSP with a new dynamic. Children came with great smiles and make HSP remember the family it is.

This day was also the official opening of government schools for all classes, after partially and periodically opening 9, 10, 11, 12 classes in the last 2 years. All children from HSP went back to school in their beautiful uniforms.

On February 19th was the HSP Jalpaiguri Olympic Games Jalpaiguri 2022, a memorable moment. The opening ceremony was the same of the real one: three children carried the Olympic flame and went around the field, the little girls performed a dance, inaugurating the HSP Jalpaiguri 2022 Olympic Games. The different disciplines were adapted to each group. The games were: the passing ball game, the potato-spoon race, backwards dadas race, blind race, ball and bottle game... as well as dances. Then we had a wonderful concert by the boys led by our brother Emmanuel. Mael, the head of the

MEPs volunteship in Paris made the trip to visit us. We then had a good meal to regain strength. In the afternoon, the sports game continued. At the end of each event, the first three winners were rewarded! The first ones received a big plate, the second ones a small plate and the third ones a glass and all'the others a bati (bowl). For other events, the first prize was a large bucket for washing and laundry, the second prize was a small bucket and the third places received water bowls. Previous to the event, all the didis and dadas organized and prepared everything. We started by drawing the racetrack with white powder on the ground. Then the dadas built bamboo stands covered with tarpaulins for the children, as well as a shelter for the jury. Then for the decoration, we cut out garlands, blew up balloons, hung up children's drawings, built a podium ... Finally we formed the teams according to the level of each child. This ceremony/day was a long process as it took 3 days to prepare everything. The involvement and dedication of the didis and dadas were priceless.

EMERGENCY RELIEF DISTRIBUTION

In 2021, Covid pandemic severely affected India again. As many international newpapers showed, images were terrible with people dying on the street. This time, central government decided to let each state government decide about imposing lockdowns or not. In West Bengal, second lockdown started in the beginning of may 2021, until mid July. As usual, these lockdowns severly affect the poorest as they are not allowed to work, and small local shops are mostly closed.



beneficiaries. This year we have given many household utility items with best branded quality. What is more, we provided consistent meals for 450 families.

Overall, we distribute our relief ration among beneficiaries according to their need, socio- economic condition and Family income irrespective of their caste, colour and creed.

In 2021 we had a relief distribution committee with members actively participating in distribution process. We also gave a special focus on documentation process of relief distribution.

Considering the present pandemic condition unemployment and inflation of essential commodities is one of the big thrushes in our economy. As a result many Families pull back from middle class economy to poor. We are receiving many phone calls and many people are coming personally for relief. The feedback from beneficiaries is good and they said that rations will support their Families for seven to ten days.

HSP is trying its best to help every families. We try to keep a community spirit where everybody is supportive of each other. It is mandatory in these hard times.

REHABILITATION HOMES

Disabled Children in rural India face huge levels of **discrimination**, especially girls children. Gender discrimination is one of the main reason, even in their own families. As a result of discrimination, literacy rate among girl child is comparatively low than Boy's child but not only. Child marriage, dowry, cross boarder trafficking & commercial sex work gradually increase in our community. In India, the mothers are often illogically blamed for their child's disability. Their children are commonly shunned and hidden away, deprived of social contact and motivation.

Malnourishment is common for these children, and they are at increased risk of physical and sexual abuse. Many children who could make significant progress suffer unnecessarily due to lack of attention and proper support, while parent's poverty prevents them from seeking out specialists.



Since these disabled persons are deprived of basic education, it is very difficult to find jobs. The government however, has introduced schemes which could guarantee jobs for these disabled people.

This year from the 3rd of may 2021 West Bengal was put under lockdown. All Homes and Schools were closed in Howrah. Activities were stopped but we were able to keep our children in our home.

During almost the whole year, the centers welcome children in the best possible conditions. We kept activities inside the homes. It was also a good challenge for HSP to find new ways of teaching, entertaining and helping the children in the best way.

The children were just waiting for one thing: to go back to school and see their friends again. This happened finally in february 2022...

In HSP, We follow the development and progress of the children at their own pace and according to their capacity, giving them all the attention they need. Our aim is to give them better education and health as a basic need for better development and a better life.

For this year, we emphasis our trainings on child protection. In October and November 2021, two sessions for staff took place in Ashaneer with external experts and members of West Bengal administration.



HOMES achievements



Education

Schools only fully opened in February 2022. Before that, children got online courses, except at EPN and Baksara teachers came and gave classes in open area with small ratio of children.

Physiotherapy & Psychotherapy

Most of our children receive regular physiotherapy or psychotherapy sessions in our Homes. It is an essential component of our rehabilitation homes.

Health

We regularly organized Medical check-up for our children in our Homes.

Indian Cancer Society visited our Lalkuthi Home, along with five Doctors and two Nurses. Children and staff from other three centres in Howrah came for Check up and Blood test. Mr Joydip from Lions Club Programme arranged this special check up.

Co-curricular activities

Developing the abilities (physical, social, cognitive, psychological...) of our children is one of our priorities. The children can improve their abilities with occupational and creative skills such as: drawing, singing, painting, greeting cards, arts and crafts, sewing, tailoring /cutting and work education. They get lessons in dance, in Taekwondo (Jordighi Home) and sports. The children take care of the environment and do gardening. They enjoyed seeing the beautiful flowers they helped grow.

This year children received computer training in Lalkuthi and Ashaneer with volunteers Clement, Jeanne, Alice, and in Jalpaiguri with Florence, Irene, Matthieu, and Emmanuel.

Women with some children are taking part in the vocational activities and receive training in workshop (Jute, candle, carpentry, craft...).

During the year, the children took part in the Football Tournament in August 2021. We mixed up the team between homes to have the team on the same level. Brazil team Won (see pictures). HSP Olympic games happened in Jalpaiguri in January

Kids received many award as a bucket for washing and laundry for the first position, the second prize was a small bucket and the third places received water bowls. The children receive also computer training in Bakuabari, Mogradangi, Baksara, Lal

The children also like to listen to music, to play together and to watch educational movies.

Food & Diet

All Homes are following a diet chart in order to give the children the necessary energy and protein required to grow well. Our children have four meals per day (Breakfast, Lunch, Tiffin and Dinner). They eat rice, egg, fish, chicken, fruits, milk, vegetables and dal. They love it and grow well

New Homes' Food diet 2022

Eating is part of our lives: it is essential to stay in good health, both physically and mentally. Eating well is even more important for children and teenagers, as they are growing, so they have special needs to be fulfilled.

Mallika Biswas, Child Development Officer, and Alice Lemaire, MEP volunteer and food engineer, have worked together on the children food diet in the four homes of Howrah. According to the children's nutritional needs and tastes, they have reworked the food charts, implemented changes in each home. The specificities of each home (kitchen, children age...) have been taken into account, thanks to regular meetings, involving homes incharges and also cooks. In January 2022, a "test phase" was organized. Changes were temporarily implemented so that cooks and children could try and get used to the changes. After this stage, cooks and children shared their feedbacks in different forums and final food charts were released. Main changes include the increase of the fruit quantity







from once to twice a week, milk is now provided to all children below 12 years old as well as disabled or weak children. Also, the diversity of the food provided was improved. Cost effectiveness has also been taken into account when carrying out those changes, making the new food menus successful both for children and HSP.

Celebration & Participation

We celebrated and enjoyed many occasions with participation of all the children: Christmas Gathering, Republic day (flag hoisting and cultural programme), Independence Day (flag hoisting and patriotic songs), Teacher's Day, Children's Day, Rabindra Jayanti (songs, dances...), Holi, Diwali, Saraswati Puja, Netaji Birth Day (flag hoisting and cultural programme)...

For these events, the children received : small gifts, sweets and chocolates....

In Lalkuthi, on august 15, the National Flag was hoisted by our Home Incharge. Local donors Parvinder Sing, and Bimal Gomes, Uncle and Manju Aunty, Joydep and Priyojit attended the ceremony On november 14: Children's Day. Birthday of Sarbopally Radhakrishna was celebrated. Sarbopally loves children very much. Teachers made drama play children and provided bowl as gifts. The children enjoyed and were very thankful to the teachers.

All these moments are precious for our children who can express and share their smile and joy.

Farming

In Jalpaiguri, we cultivate paddy, potatoes, and different kinds of vegetables or fruits in our land. We have goats and cows that produce milk, given to our children and sold on the market. We have ducks and chicken that give us eggs for our consumption.

Our challenges

We aim at developing more training for our staff. Next year, multiple staff from home will attend a 2 months training from IICP (Indiand Insitute for Cerebral Palsy from April to June 2022.

We also aim at making HSP a more sustainable and ecological place. With new solar panels coming to EPN and new training sessions for our staffs

EDUCATION PROGRAMMES

India is one of the largest and fastest growing economies in the world, but on the other hand, there is still a **section of society that is deprived of the basic needs of education**. Millions of children in India still earn daily wages and most of them do not attend school due to poverty and low family income. Thus, **millions of poor children are deprived of education** in India. Therefore, the Right to Education Policy was introduced in 2009 to promote the education of all children between the ages of 6 and 14. They stressed that education is their fundamental right so that no child is deprived of education, which in fact is the key to sustainability.

As a result of this policy, children who could not afford education began to receive free education with government support. It even instructed private schools and NGO schools to reserve 25% of places for students from the economically weakest sections of the Society. Our late **Father Francis Laborde** had a vision with a perfect mission to start an education program for poor children 40 years ago. He started in HSP an educational institution for poor, destitute and disadvantaged children, providing **free education**, with **free food and accommodation facilities**. Education ranges from kindergarten to class 10 regardless of caste creed or origins for every child.

Our education program includes non-formal schools (6 to 14 years old), bridging courses (3 to 18 years old), created for dropouts and out-of-school children. Formal schools from kindergarten to class VIII, age range of 4 to 14. During the pandemic, teachers at HSP ensured that no child was left behind in their studies. We continued to take lessons via Whatsapp and provided materials from schools through parents. Now, after the pandemic, many young new children have joined after schools reopened.



Our education program caters to all strata of society, urban, rural and most of them are migrant children from other states like Bihar, Jharkhand, Orissa and Utter Pradesh. Since 1976, approximately 3,000 children have directly benefited from our education program. Many of them have been employed in government sectors such as railways, schools as teachers, army, police, hospitals as nurses, and other private sectors.

HEALTH PROGRAMMES

Tuberculosis is one of India's major public health problems. According to World Health Organization (WHO) estimates, India has the world's largest tuberculosis epidemic. In 2020, India accounted for 26% of the incident TB cases across the globe. India has incidence rate of 192 cases per 100,000 of population.

Despite the brief decline in TB notifications observed around the months corresponding to India's two major COVID-19 waves, the National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP) reclaimed these numbers. Accordingly, 2021 witnessed a 19% increase from the previous year in TB patients' notification, with 19,33,381 cases. In 2021, the vision of the National Strategic Plan for Elimination of Tuberculosis (NSP 2017- 25) permeated to state and district levels yet again to encompass more objectives. Eighteen States have committed to Ending TB by 2025 by formally implementing Stat specific Strategic Plans which shall serve as a guiding tool for the programme managers and staff at the district and sub-district level towards the elimination of Tuberculosis.

There are estimated 20 to 25 lakh TB cases in the country every year, previous to covid period. We have seen Covid 19 have killed nearly 5 lakh people, but more than 4 lakh people die of TB each year. And these are mostly people below the age of 60 years, the earning members of the family. The community and Govt. need to come together to fight TB and eliminate it by the 2025. That deadline set by Prime Minister.

Poverty and a lack of financial resources are also associated with malnutrition, poor housing conditions, substance misuse, and HIV/AIDS incidence. These factors often contribute to a weakened immune system and are accordingly correlated with a higher susceptibility to TB. They also tend to have a greater impact on people from high incidence countries such as India. Indeed, addressing these factors may have a stronger correlation with decreased TB incidence than removing the financial burdens associated with care. Yet, the RNTCP's treatment protocols do not address these social determinants of health.

In 2020, TB case notified Male 52038, Female 25416 in west Bengal.

HSP works around Howrah district with TB patients. The patients come mainly from different areas of Howrah like: Tikiapara, Pilkhana, PM Bustee, ARP Lane Bustee, Ramkrishnapur Ghat Bustee etc. They are mainly from poor families and live in very congested slum. Due to lack of nutritional food and large number of family members the adults and mainly children suffer from TB. During that time they do not take proper medicine or discontinue the medicine, due to that many patients develops Multi drug resistance (MDR). That led to worsen the condition of the patient and often patient dies. During that treatment period the patient needs close supervision from Health workers and need good nutritious food. Otherwise the TB cases often relapses and it becomes difficult to cure the patient.





came out negatives. She came to know about us tahnks to the word of mouth in the slums. She then came to Foreshore road dispensary. Our doctor checked up on her and suggested


husband. She was suffering from severe abdomin pain and Dysentry for 5-6 months, Sometimes vomiting and having fever.


